## How the Lifestyle of Worship Builds up the Body of Christ.

"And you shall be called 'oaks of righteousness, the planting of the Lord,' that He may be glorified." -From Isaiah 61:1-3





## The Branches, Leaves and Fruit:

Here's how we can understand this analogy: The branches, leaves, and fruit represent the *act* of worshipthat is, the *expressions* of worship. All worship demands expression. So does real love or real faith. In fact, "faith without works is *dead*.". (*James 2:17*) Think about this: leaves of a tree actually *eat* light! That is a process called photosynthesis. When we lead people in *expressing* their faith to God, new life happens! Wonderful things can follow as a direct result. True expressiveness of faith is natural to the child of God from the moment they receive Christ (*Gal.4:6*; *Ps.95:1*) It's our job to show them how!

## The Roots:

The scriptural truth of who God is -combined with our corresponding faith. *Like roots mixed with the soil*. Consequently to be a great worshiper, you have to be a great student of the Word. He *is* the Word, so to truly know Him, you have to hunger for and know the Word of God. {As a sidebar, when God "moves" prophetically, the Holy Spirit is most often going to bring scriptures, or portions of scriptures to the mind of the person bringing the message. (*John 14.26*) Thus the Word becomes alive in us to encourage the congregation. (1 Cor.14:26-39) }

## The Trunk:

This is where the maturity of a tree is measured. In the secret place of the trunk! (Is.30:15) This can be understood as revelation from God that causes maturity in the believer. The greatest reward of true worship is that God uses it to reveal Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit. Revelation of His promises is what makes us more Christ-like, more steadfast and unshakable by life's storms and persecutions. (2 Peter 1:3-4) So worship has everything to do Christ changing us into mature, strong believers. The Spirit-filled life! (Eph.5:18-19)

All three of these parts depend on the other.
